Russian Vowels

In the Russian Alphabet there are 10 vowels, here they are:

Vowel	Sound Vowel Makes
A a	sounds like AH as car, tar, bar
Еe	sounds like YE as yes, mess, chess
Ëë	sounds like YO as in yo-yo, bird, third, do you hear that yo sound?
Ии	sounds like EE sea, me, bee
0 0	sounds like O when stressed as in nose, pose, close, rose sounds like AH when unstressed just like cot, rod, toss, Tom.
Уу	sounds like OO as in Goose, booth, took, cook
Ыы	sounds like ewe or i as in bill, ill, mill
Ээ	sounds like EH as in bell, shell, tell, sell
Юю	sounds like U as in U-boat, you, cute, puke, suit
Яя	sounds like YA as in yard, sad, cat, bad, fad

Please note that these vowels break down into soft and hard sounding vowels, see if you can hear the difference between:

A and Я	Кеер saying А Я А Я А Я А Я А Я until you start hearing the difference
Э and E	Keep saying $\Im \in \Im \in \Im \in \Im \in \Im \in U$ tuntil you start hearing the difference
O and Ë	Keep saying O \ddot{E} O \ddot{E} O \ddot{E} O \ddot{E} O \ddot{E} until you start hearing the difference
У and Ю	Кеер saying У Ю У Ю У Ю У Ю until you start hearing the difference
Ы and И	Кеер saying Ы И Ы И Ы И Ы И U until you start hearing the difference

In the above the first column A, O, \exists , Y and \bowtie are all hard vowels, while \exists , E, E, \bowtie and \exists are all soft sounding, do you hear that difference in sounds?

OK that leaves only one vowel out \breve{M} (pronounced as \varkappa краткая), however the sound that it actually makes in a word is same as the English letter Y Example, in the Enlish the word boy, toy, soy or the words bay, say, okay.

So, do you hear how the letter Y works in english?

Do you hear what Y does with the previous letter? (it puts a twang to it or softens it). The letter \check{H} works the same way in russian, yes it puts a twang on a vowel.

Example, in russian БО is read like "boe" but БОЙ is read like "boy".

Can you read the following: АЙ, ЭЙ, ЕЙ, УЙ, ОЙ, ТОЙ, ТОЙКА, ТОПАЙ
